Sacrificial branches, there is no doubt that a sacrificial branch will help thicken a trunk. The branch as it elongates and becomes thicker needs the trunk to enlarge to support it and provide nourishment to it. The down side to sacrificial branches is when you remove them you have a scar to contend with. I personally do not leave sacrificial branches because they leave a scar. I feel for the little bit of energy the sacrificial branch uses this energy can be shifted to the other branches to help develop ramification. As the top of the tree grows new branches more nourishment is need to be transported. The only way the tree can increase transporting more nourishment is to increase the circumference of the trunk. But a sacrificial also helps in creating taper to the trunk. Yes, but you still have a scar to deal with.

If you comb out the roots, place the roots on something solid like a tile you will encourage surface root development this will increase the buttress of the tree. This will mute the tree not having a lot of taper. If you decide to do the surface root technique select something that will not cause harm or kill the tree. Pressure treated wood, painted wood or plywood are not good options as they all contain chemicals that can cause harm to the tree. Inert materials such as ceramic tile, slate, plastic, fiberglass can be used and reused with no ill effect on the tree.

Trunk splitting is another option to thicken the trunk of your favorite bonsai. Not all trees will recover from such a trauma. Trees like Boxwood, Junipers, and Ficus respond very well to this technique. Take your bonsai tree out of its container, and gently wash away excess soil from the roots. Then use a trunk splitter, wood chisel, rotary tool, or saw to split your bonsai trunk from

the bottom up. Use wires or wood wedges to keep the split trunk apart. To ensure proper healing, allow the roots of the break to grow freely. Immediately transplant it into a wide pot with fresh soil. This will allow the roots to spread out and be able to take advantage of all the new nutrients.

Grafting is another option provided you have seedlings of the same genetic material. Grafting seedlings to the base of a trunk allows you to thicken a bonsai tree trunk and design taper. Taking several seedlings placing them on the trunk and wrap them tightly to the trunk with Chinese wrapping twine, grafting tape or raffia. When placing the seedlings start on left and right side of the tree with the front of the tree facing you. As you move up the trunk take a seedling or two from each side and shift it to the back. Continue wrapping the tree and repeat shifting seedlings to the back of the tree. After a year or two depending on threat of growth the seedlings should fuse to each other and the trunk. Then those seedlings you directed to the back can be cut off and you will not see the cuts.
